
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Aladdin, Jasmine, and Genie

My brother flew in from Korea last week, and I was able to spend a good amount of time with him. We went to watch one of the Broadway shows, Aladdin. I'm sure you know but it is about Aladdin, a lovable street urchin, and Jasmine, the beautiful daughter of Sultan of Agrabah, falling in love but a peddler can't marry a princess. The story takes a drastic turn when Aladdin finds a magic lamp, and within the lamp, Genie who grants three wishes.

But here is what I want us to shift our attention to. All these three characters have in common: they are all trapped. Aladdin in a street filled with dirt. Jasmine in a gold plated palace especially when her father, sultan, is arranging a marriage for her. And Genie in the lamp. Aladdin had wished Genie to make him a prince. A prince with 75 golden camels, 53 purple peacocks, 95 Persian monkeys, and the song goes on. A pompous entry on an embellished elephant to the city. He confidently presented a grandeur proposal, but Jasmine was not impressed. Here, Aladdin learns a lesson of authenticity. He did not have to be someone else to earn Jasmine's heart. It was through authentic relationships that all three were liberated.



In this Lenten journey, our goal is to let go of the things that make us feel trapped, contained, and shackled. What is containing you in a palace? What is trapping you in a lamp? It could be unresolved conflicts with family or friends. You could be complacent with your life and faith and see no need to go deeper with God and with others. You could be going through difficult times such as separations, unachieved hopes and dreams, financial struggles,

and so on.

We are in this Lenten journey of fasting, prayer, reflection, and almsgiving. We are heading towards Easter. Easter does not mean God will be your personal genie and make your three wishes come true. But true freedom and liberation can be found in our authentic, genuine, and personal relationship with God and with others. There, we will find

unshakable. Wait with an expectant heart that Jesus' new life is mine, that Jesus' resurrection is mine, and that we will experience God's liberating hands.

New Worship Series: Beauty for Ashes

We have looked at stories of women who encountered Jesus and how Jesus' ministry liberated and empowered them. When these women met Jesus and laid their ashes (symbolizing two things: mortality and sin), Jesus took their ashes in and traded for something beautiful: new life. We will continue our worship series with an invitation to do the same. Come to Christ as you are and watch how God will trade your ashes for a beauty!

4.10 Palm Sunday Anointing Jesus

No male disciple foresaw the death of Jesus but only one woman did. She anoints Jesus with a jar of perfume. She helps us prepare on this day of Jesus' triumph entry to Jerusalem that after all, Jesus will die for us, becoming the ashes on our behalf.

4.14 Maundy Thursday at 7pm


To remember Jesus' loving acts, we will share the bread and juice as well as include the washing of hands. May we be reminded of his unconditional love.

4.15 Good Friday at 7pm

The night Jesus was in agony and died is called Good Friday. How can one's death be called good?

4.17 Easter Sunday

Jesus rose from the ashes! Our healer and redeemer! We will celebrate the gift of new life and eternal life that Jesus gives to us on Easter Sunday.

To Be United Methodist: What is Itineracy?

When people new to United Methodism hear that a new pastor will soon be serving their congregation, they may ask: Why don't we get to choose our pastor? Who makes these decisions?

The short answers describe how United Methodists have agreed to meet the pastoral needs of congregations. John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement, preached up to 40,000 sermons in his lifetime. He was an "itinerant" preacher, traveling from town to town in England, setting up Methodist societies. Thousands of the oldest United Methodist congregations today trace their history to a circuit rider.

This traveling from place to place to begin Methodist societies in principle led to the itinerant system The United Methodist Church uses today.

"Itinerancy" refers specifically to the commitment by pastors to go and serve wherever their bishops send them. "Appointment" is the action taken by bishops. These are different, yet related.

Before they are ordained or licensed, clergy in The United Methodist Church agree to serve where their bishop appoints them. Appointments are for one year at a time. For elders and local pastors, particularly, the goal is to match the gifts and graces of the particular pastor with the ministry needs of a particular congregation. In this "serial leadership" of consecutive pastors – no two are alike – over time, the combination of skills blends to form a broad base of developed ministries.
